	§ SAPS and NPA				Provincial SAPS have prepared robust VOC plans including the Festive Season plans. NPA plays a role in the strategy development. Business Against Crime South Africa is mobilising Business to respond properly in support to SAPS provincial plans.
	Crime reduction through Leadership and Management Development		<input type="checkbox"/>		Training in a number of identified priority police stations continue, in parallel to the SAPS roll-out of the LDP, with sponsorship from the business community. Business sponsorship is received in SAPS-identified areas of need such as the 100-day improvement project of the 10111 Call Centre in Midrand. Additional areas of need have been identified by the SAPS, and are currently being defined for potential business skills transfer opportunities.
		<input type="checkbox"/>			Over 1,200 SAPS leaders and managers have been trained through the programme. SAPS are currently underway with the training of facilitators for the broadened and institutionalised roll-out of the programme.

	§ Reduction of Violent Organised Crime	<input type="checkbox"/>			Through the partnership: investigation, arrests and prosecution capacity has been enhanced as these apply to violent and organised crime cases across the country. 500 SAPS Detectives have been trained in Gauteng courtesy of funding from SAIA and affiliated organisations. Alignment and vetting of private sector security guards is being piloted in the Honeydew cluster of police stations with the plan to roll this out nationally, once proven.
	Vehicle Crime (Hijacking and Theft)	<input type="checkbox"/>			Technology-assisted roadside law enforcement continues through the mobile vehicle equipped with Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) scanners through which over 1,000 stolen vehicles have been recovered. The Acting National Commissioner of SAPS has approved a pilot of the ANPR technology in Gauteng. This will be rolled-out

				to other priority provinces in conjunction with Government partners and stakeholders in due course. The quest to reduce fraud and corruption and improve service delivery in the vehicle management arena continues through interactions across the country in association with the Road Traffic Management Corporation.
	Business Robberies			The national Joint Operation Centre (JOC) established during November 2007 continues throughout the year, thus enhancing co-ordination and the response between the private sector and Government to robberies. Industry standards, including CCTV, Cash-in-Transit and Cash Management, have been introduced across the business sector and are being implemented nationally. A new approach to managing cash through the establishment of a single Shopping Centre cash hub concept is being piloted in Johannesburg. A joint Government / Business Small business robbery plan established with participation by DTI, the Presidency and Business and Govt Stakeholders is being established with the initial pilot being run in the JHB CBD and Thembisa township. The voluntary vetting and alignment of private security personnel has been initiated with all stakeholders supporting the initiative. To-date, over 30% of members have been vetted.
	House Robberies			The house robberies focus is initially on the Honeydew policing cluster, and is being expanded to cover other high residential robbery crime areas. The premises donated by Road Wing through BACSA at Honeydew is operational and includes a Joint Operations Centre (JOC). The initiative will formally be launched mid-November 2008. The Honeydew best practice model is already being implemented in the Alexandra cluster (Bramley, Midrand, Sandton and Sandringham).
	<b>A significant reduction in the levels of targeted crime types measured against appropriate international benchmarks.</b>			
	§ Reduce Violent and Organised Crime			SAPS continue to make arrests of suspects involved in violent robberies. Prosecutors continue to fast-track the processing of cases to court. Reported crime statistics for the financial year ended March 2008 indicate that the Trio Crimes continued to increase nationally. A detailed provincial analysis shows, however, positive impacts in Gauteng. Gauteng accounts for over 50% of the national Trio crimes. In Gauteng, the rate of increase was significantly lower than in other priority provinces. This lower increase is attributable to joint Government / BACSA pilot project. The rate of increase in Gauteng was just under 2%, in sharp contrast to a recorded increase of just over 38% in the other priority provinces. The Gauteng Trio Crimes pilot project is being implemented in other provinces, i.e. KZN, WC and NW.

2		Reduction of Non-Ferrous Metal Theft			The initiative has been included in the VOC Work Group with the Deputy Minister of Safety and Security as the Chairperson. The Strategy and profile of the Initiative have been enhanced with strong buy-in from Government partners. The project has not yet secured full funding. PWC may be tasked to conduct a study on behalf of DTI to establish the impacts that the proposed export duty on non-ferrous metals will have on the economy. The results of this study are required for consideration by Treasury.
		<b>Significant improvements in the effectiveness and efficiency of the Criminal Justice System as measured against international best practice.</b>			
		§ Improvement of the Criminal Justice System			Cabinet has approved the seven-point plan aimed at improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the Criminal Justice System such that it acts as an effective deterrent to crime. Deputy Minister of the Department of Justice and Constitutional Development (DoJ and CD), Advocate Johnny de Lange, has been appointed as champion to drive and co-ordinate the implementation of this initiative. The Office of Criminal Justice Reform (OCJR) has been established. BACSA has put a team under former CEO, Willie Scholtz to support the implementation and co-ordination by the OCJR. Task teams have been established to develop and to implement approved solutions. In his 21 October 2008 Mini-Budget Speech, Minister of Finance announced Government's commitment to fighting crime and allocated additional budget for improving the performance of the CJS.
		Criminal Justice Strengthening Programme (CJSP)			This USAID-funded programme is implemented by BACSA for the benefit of DoJ and CD and NPA. Most capacity-building projects will be completed by December 2008. Magistrates, prosecutors and other officials have been trained. The system modernisation elements of the programme were delayed and will not be completed by 31 December 2008, e.g. Support to Community Courts, Re Aga Boswa, Sexual Offences and Child Justice.
		§ Commercial Crime			The 6 Specialised Commercial Crime Courts are operational - Co-ordination has been handed over by Business Against Crime South Africa to a suitable Government structure.
